



Youth Perspectives on Climate Action



Act now!

“Act now!” is the powerful message that young environmental leaders are sharing with their communities - to encourage everyone to step-up to the challenges that lay ahead in the fight against climate change.

With support from the [Ontario Trillium Foundation](#), this past school year, EcoSchools Canada launched a Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) composed of secondary students from the York-Simcoe region in Ontario, Canada. YAC members collaborated throughout the year to raise awareness and engage their peers in environmental action and change.



In spite of the new challenges presented by COVID-19, the YAC worked diligently and creatively to offer guidance into the EcoSchools program while also leading environmental projects and campaigns in their schools and communities.

We are so inspired by this group of committed youth leaders and want to share some of their thoughts and insights from the past year.

What are some of the biggest challenges you have faced this year?

“The biggest challenge was the Covid-19 pandemic because many of our initiatives were planned to be in person so we have had to quickly adapt to virtual campaigns [...] One of our successful initiatives has been our Water Initiative in which we focused on issues concerning water on a local, provincial, national, and international level. As part of our initiative, we wrote letters voicing our concern to local newspapers (which were published) and held an Importance of Water virtual workshop.”
